

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1. Goal of the communication

Aim of the project

This project Mentality aims to develop, test and disseminate a framework accompanied with an intervention advice manual to create tailor-made dementia-friendly societies (DFS) for supporting people with dementia (PWD) and carers to participate in social activities and enhance related health benefits.

Communication goal

The goal of the communication of this project is to inform the participating collaborators, direct and indirect stakeholders about the progress of the project, to facilitate that the most recent information is available for all the participants, easy to find and to make sure that the information can be used by stakeholders in their own practice. So, this communication plan aims to share the results, knowledge and experiences and to inform, make people aware and to encourage municipalities on how to develop dementia friendly societies.

2. Context of the project Mentality

In this project, the Radboudumc, department IQ healthcare, Zuyd University and Sheffield Hallam University collaborate. Radboudumc and Zuyd University share the leadership of Mentality. This project has the following organization structure: a PhD committee, a research group, a project group, an advisory group and 4 work groups for each of the participating DFS initiatives. Appendix 1 displays the members of the different groups.

Research group

The research group is responsible for the execution and the implementation of the project and co-writing of scientific publications (see Appendix 1). The research group consists of members of Radboudumc, Zuyd and Sheffield. Radboudumc and Zuyd meet every 2 months. Researchers from Sheffield will be contacted by members of the PhD committee or the project group before each meeting of the content is relevant for them. They will be informed about the project throughout and consulted when needed.

PhD committee

The responsibility for the design, content, coordination of the project and writing of scientific papers is in the hands of the PhD committee (see Appendix 1). Decisions about the content and course of the project are made by the committee and are guiding the other groups. The PhD committee consists of three researchers from Radboudumc and one researcher from Zuyd. The PhD committee meets every 4 weeks. The direct supervisors and the PhD student meet every 2 weeks.

Project group

The project group reviews the project on content, applicability and process of development. The project group is consulted on important decisions and gives advice on different relevant moments in time depending on the contents of the project. The project group is responsible for carrying out the communication plan. The project group consists of members from Dutch parties and organisations as described in Appendix 1.

Collaboration with Sheffield Hallam University

Members of University of Sheffield participate in these meetings by skype or are consulted before and after the meetings to gain their input and to discuss the outcome of the meeting afterwards. Communication with Sheffield will mainly be performed by members of the PhD committee and the research group.


Advisory group

Participants of the advisory group are representatives from various relevant professional groups and other relevant stakeholders, f.e. policy makers of local governments, in terms of content. They are asked to advice and to provide relevant information and feedback. The advisory group is consulted twice a year, in which the aim is to meet once a year face-to-face.

Work groups

In work package C, we work together in work groups on the 4 pilot DFS of Nijmegen, Wychen, Heerlen, Maasgouw and Haarlemmermeer. Knowledge and experiences will be exchanged between the workgroups and the DFS of work package A and B.

3. Target populations

The target populations can be divided into direct and indirect stakeholders, on a local, national and international level.

Direct stakeholders

Direct stakeholders include all parties participating in the project. Indirect stakeholders consist primarily of people with dementia, their representatives and their carers, and additionally of professional caregivers, municipalities and community members, scientific and educational institutions

1. Project partners and collaborators

The research group consists of the main applicants, researchers and lecturers of Radboudumc, Zuyd University and Sheffield Hallam University. The project group includes the research team complemented with representatives of persons with dementia, carers and researchers. The advisory group consists of all (co)applicants and representatives of relevant (inter)national organisations.

The work groups will be built around the pilot municipalities participating in phase C of the project: Heerlen, Wychen, Nijmegen, Haarlemmermeer and Maasgouw. The work groups of each of these pilot municipalities may vary with respect to the participants and will be installed over time.

Indirect stakeholders

2. People with dementia (PWD), their representatives and their carers

The main target population where the project is built around includes PWD, their representatives and their informal carers. They are the most important experience experts and stakeholders of this project and they will be included throughout the project.

3. Professional caregivers

Health care professionals, such as registered district nurses, casemanagers (in the Netherlands specialized nurses who coordinate care around PWD), occupational therapists, physiotherapists, general practitioners are important members in providing formal (home) care of PWD.

4. Municipalities and community members

This target population includes the social environment and communities of PWD who live at home, their representatives and carers; people who are involved in/are related to the lives of PWD and who are willing to contribute to developing dementia-friendly societies. First of all municipalities and local governments have a central role in organizing (long-term) care for their inhabitants, but also businesses, services and agencies may be involved, such as public

transport, local shops, etcetera. Besides more formal parties also citizens (e.g. citizens' initiatives) and volunteers who are engaged in DFS-activities are relevant stakeholders.

5. *Scientific and educational institutions*

Stakeholders relevant to facilitate dissemination and implementation of dementia-friendly initiatives include e.g. scientific and educational institutions, researchers, lecturers, students from different disciplines (such as health care, social work, facility management, ICT etcetera).

4. Messages

We show the main communication goals and messages for each of the target populations (see Table 1 and 2).

6. Dissemination of the results

Dissemination of results will take place among all participating parties within their own network, using their regular channels e.g. websites, newsletters, information brochures, local meetings with members, working conferences.

Results will be also disseminated via related organizations/platforms, presentations, (inter)national conferences and scientific meetings and publications in national journal or platforms/newsletter for people with dementia, via acquainted researchers, lecturers of Dutch educational institutes (universities, universities of applied sciences and institutes for vocational training).
